Buncrana & Glengad Involved in 1916 Easter Rising Art Project

As part of the 1916 Sackville Street Art Project, the Buncrana and Glengad centres are creating a 'Dutch Billy' style house (see photos below) typical of houses in Dublin during the time of the 1916 Easter Rising. Sackville Street was the name of O Connell Street at this time. This art project allows learners to find out about what happened in the Rising through art. The aim of the project is to commemorate civilians who were killed in the 1916 Rising; they're concen-



trating on the life story of Joseph Donohoe, 98 Marlborough Street, who was 19 when he was killed. A total of 262 civilian houses will be made by educational groups, youth groups and individuals to represent the civilians who were killed at this time. The artwork will be exhibited in the National Botanic Gardens in Dublin during Easter which they are looking forward to attending. The learners work on the project in their woodcraft class, when they work on the house, and their communications class, when they work on Joseph's life story. Lifford Lead Centres on Sports Leader Award

Last year Lifford Coordinator Aidan Callaghan completed Sports Leader Award training through the Donegal Sports Partnership and will now roll it out to learners from across the county. The course is designed to give learners the opportunity to learn and develop the skills required to help take charge of a sporting or exercise group. It includes communication skills, decision making, what is leadership and what makes a good leader?, adapting to change, developing a coaching plan and health and safety.

Learners will work alongside qualified coaches to develop leadership skills and take charge of exercise sessions, designed to meet the needs of the group they are working with. Learners will also work with local primary schools and groups to develop skills and qualities required to complete assessments towards the end of the course. If successful, learners will be able to volunteer at their local sporting clubs and assist qualified coaches in developing and taking charge of sports sessions. Progression from this course includes learners gaining Level 1 coaching certificates in a sport of their choice.



Gortahork Review 'Blood Upon the Rose' (Read DL)

We are reading a comic as part of The ReadDL project in Youthreach Gortahork. *Blood Upon the Rose* is a comic book about the 1916 Easter Rising in Ireland, it was written and drawn by Gerry Hunt and is approximately 48 pages long. The book itself is in memory of the author's father, Patrick Hunt who served in

the Easter Rising and later in the War of Independence. The following is a summary of this comic. The plot of the book is set on the day of the Rising and showcased the struggle and seriousness of the event. The path the author took was in favour of the rebels and

pointed out the many divides in Dublin at the time, the rebels were referred to as "Shiners" by the public and demonized as they marched upon the GPO. The style of the book is not my cup of tea and I didn't enjoy the comic to be honest. The plot was rushed and many of the small "events" in the book were really subjective and were not factual. I enjoyed the fact that the author chose to include so many rebels and not just focusing on the main men like so many others. As it is a comic I would recommend this book for kids or the odd man

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Busy Girls Active Programmes in Centres

All of the Youthreach centres are involved in the Girls Active programme once again this year. This programme is funded by the HSE and Donegal Youthreach centres first got involved in this initiative in 2010. Girls Active targets teenage girls in the Northwest (County Donegal, Sligo and Leitrim). It is a joint initiative between the Health Service Executive West (HSE), Sligo Sport and Recreation Partnership, Donegal Sports Partnership and Youth Sport West. The programme is designed to increase the number of teenage girls involved in long-term regular physical activity through developing more supportive environments in schools, and now Youthreach centres. Staff from all centres undertook training in September 2015 to enable them to provide targeted sports programmes to female learners. Lifford for example, are pictured below at jiving lessons and go to the gym and play badminton on a weekly basis. The programme is supported and monitored by Lynda McGuiness the Physical Activity Coordinator with the local Health Promotion Unit.
