

What is an apprenticeship?

Why should I consider an apprenticeship?

Apprenticeships offer you the chance to gain skills, experience and qualifications while earning a wage. You have the opportunity to gain practical work experience and qualifications without incurring a student loan and at the same time build your employment skills and CV.

What does it cost to do an apprenticeship?

The cost to do an apprenticeship is very minimal. In fact, the model is 'earn while you learn' and so you are paid for the duration of your apprenticeship even when away from the employer in an education or training centre. Apprentices pay a student fee when attending their off-the-job training in a Higher Education Institute. This fee will generally equate to the amount of time the apprentice spends in the Higher Education Institute.

Where can I do an apprenticeship?

As the apprenticeship is a combination of on- and off-the-job training, with at least 50% of the time spent with an employer, you will do part of your apprenticeship with an employer and other elements with training/education providers. The location of the training/education providers is dependent on the craft or occupation chosen.

When can I apply for an apprenticeship?

You have to secure employment with an approved employer as an apprentice and meet the eligibility criteria for your chosen apprenticeship before you can be registered as an apprentice. You can be registered and commence the traditional craft apprenticeships any time of the year. However, intake for the new apprenticeships launched post 2016 usually takes place just once a year.

An apprenticeship is a full-time training programme that takes between two and four years to complete depending on the trade or occupation being undertaken.

An apprenticeship is a programme of formal education and training. It combines learning in a place of work along with learning in an education or training centre. It is an "earn while you learn" model of training. Craft Apprenticeships include traditional trades such as Electrical, Carpentry and Joinery, Plumbing and Motor Mechanics, and these apprenticeships are delivered in 7 phases over a minimum of four years. Since 2016, the range of apprenticeships has increased significantly and now includes apprenticeships in industries such as Hospitality and Food, ICT, Insurance, Property Services, Finance, Sales, and Agriculture and Horticulture. Apprenticeships vary in duration from 2–4 years and also in level of award upon successful completion (levels 5 –10).

"I chose an apprenticeship as I could see it was the practical subjects I had a flare for at school. Although I achieved enough points to go down the CAO route, because I had a great interest in cars, a motor mechanics apprenticeship seemed the best option for me. I did check the CAO for options through the third level route but nothing was available with as much to offer someone looking to work in the motor trade. I'm really enjoying my apprenticeship so far. It's great being able to study your trade in which your job is guaranteed while also getting a salary in comparison to the ever-distant end to college and the uncertainty of a job when you graduate. A person with an apprenticeship always has the ability to get a job in a country of their choice as they are recognised worldwide. From going down the apprenticeship route I have found that the third level route is not the only option and, in some cases, not the best option for everyone."

What is a PLC?

Why should I consider a PLC?

-

PLCs are designed as a step towards skilled employment and, as such, they are closely linked to industry and its needs.

What does it cost to do a PLC?

-

A registration fee of €100 applies to all students. Non-medical card holders must also pay a QQI exam fee of €50.

Where can I do a PLC?

-

Donegal ETB's FET Service offers
PLCs in four locations – Buncrana
(Further Education and Training Centre),
Killybegs (St Catherine's Vocational
School), Letterkenny (Errigal College
and Letterkenny Further Education and
Training Centre, Business Park Road) and
Stranorlar (Finn Valley College).

When can I apply for a PLC?

-

You can apply for a PLC anytime from November each year for starting the following September. You can apply through the school, online through https://www.donegaletb.ie/fetcoursefinder or through the CAO - https://www.cao.ie/(from November each year).

Post Leaving Certificate or PLC courses are full-time one year courses that offer a mixture of practical work, academic work and work experience. Post Leaving Certificate courses adopt an integrated approach, focusing on technical knowledge, core skills and work experience. Almost half of the time spent on a PLC is devoted to knowledge and skills training related to employment, with a further quarter spent on relevant work-based experience.

What is Specific Skills Training?

Why should I consider specific skills training?

Specific skills training give participants the opportunity to develop cutting edge skills and knowledge making them more skilled, more employable and enhancing their career options and enables employers to access a pipeline of talent and students.

What does it cost to do Specific Skills training?

Specific Skills Training courses are free and you may be paid a training allowance for the duration of your course. You can also claim an accommodation allowance if you need to live away from home for the duration of the course or a travel allowance.

Where can I do specific skill training?

Donegal ETB's FET Service offers specific skills training in a number of locations around the county including its Gaoth Dobhair and Letterkenny
Training Centres.

When can I apply for specific skills training?

_

You can apply for specific skills training at various times throughout the year.
You can apply online through https://www.donegaletb.ie/fetcoursefinder (use the skills word such as welding or surf as your Keyword) or through the CAO - https://www.cao.ie/.

Specific skills training courses are full-time courses ranging from six to forty weeks duration. They are designed to provide students with a range of employability related skills and formal vocational qualifications to facilitate those entering the labour market for the first time and for those wishing to update or acquire new skills.

Donegal ETB offers specific skills training courses at Levels 3, 4, 5 and 6 through QQI or other industry recognised accreditation in a range of areas including:

- Bus Driving
- Business Administration
- Data Science
- Financial and Management Accounts
- Heavy Goods Vehicle (HGV) Driving
- Multimedia
- Surf Instructor and Beach Lifeguard
- Welding

What is a Tertiary Degree?

Why should I consider a tertiary degree?

Tertiary degrees provide a seamless access route into degree programmes. They give applicants the opportunity to start their degree in the Further Education and Training (FET) sector. Unlike other degree courses, applicants do not need to wait for CAO points as they can apply directly. Shortlisted applicants will then be invited for an interview where they will be required to show evidence of their eligibility based on the information provided when applying.

For those interested in pursuing a nursing career, this access route guarantees the twenty people who complete the access course a place in ATU's General Nursing degree.

What does it cost to do a tertiary degree?

There are no fees attached to the first year of a tertiary degree or the tertiary degree access route (nursing) with Donegal ETB and applicants are eligible to apply for a SUSI grant. You may also be eligible to apply for a Back to Education Allowance (BTEA).

Where can I do a tertiary degree?

Donegal ETB's **FET** Service offers it's four tertiary degrees in Letterkenny. You will then progress to an ATU campus in Letterkenny, Sligo or Galway City, depending on your progression choice.

When can I apply for a tertiary degree?

You can apply for a tertiary degree anytime between January and September each year for starting in September through https://www.donegaletb.ie/fetcoursefinder (use degree as your Keyword).

A tertiary degree is a joint further and higher education degree programme. Students commence their third level experience in further education with the Education and Training Board but will complete the remainder in higher education colleges. It varies from 1 to 2 years studying in the Further Education and Training College, depending on the course.

Donegal ETB currently offers year one of the following tertiary degrees:

 Tertiary access route into the Bachelor of Science (Honours) in General Nursing

"I previously attended Loreto Community school Milford and was told about the Tertiary Access Route into the Bachelor of Science (Honours) in General Nursing course by my career guidance counsellor, as another route to doing general nursing. My reason for choosing this course was to get an introduction to nursing before moving onto ATU as I was worried about starting straight into a big college at 17. It was also reassuring to know I would have a second option if I didn't get the points I needed. I applied online with a personal statement and some other information and got an email asking me to come in for an interview. It was a very simple process overall and I got an interview date within a week.

This course has been an extremely beneficial experience so far and I'm very glad I chose to do it. I'll now be continuing my education into nursing with work experience, patient moving, manual handling and a great insight to what nursing's all about. From doing our skills demonstrations I have gained a lot of skills that will help me in the long run when starting into ATU and also in my work experience and I cannot recommend this course enough. I am extremely grateful for the opportunity and would encourage anyone thinking about nursing to definitely give it very good consideration."

What is a Traineeship?

Why should I consider a traineeship?

Traineeships enable students to develop cutting edge skills and knowledge onthe-job, making them more skilled, more employable and enhancing their career options.

What does it cost to do a traineeship?

_

Traineeships are free and you may be paid a training allowance but some fees may apply. For example with the Beauty Therapist Traineeship, students are responsible for purchasing their own makeup kit costs which generally cost around €350.00 (a payment plan can be arranged in this case). You can also claim an accommodation allowance if you need to live away from home for the duration of the course or a travel allowance.

Where can I do a traineeship?

Donegal ETB provides traineeships in a variety of locations across the county.

When can I apply for a traineeship?

You can apply for a traineeship at various times throughout the year.
You can apply online through https://www.donegaletb.ie/fetcoursefinder or through the CAO - http://www.cao.ie/ (from November each year).

A traineeship is a programme of structured training which combines learning in an education and training setting and in the workplace aiming to improve employment outcomes for participants and increase retention and productivity within industry.

The benefits of choosing a **11** route after completing the Leaving Certificate are vast and rewarding. The opportunity in earning as you learn with an apprenticeship, testing the water in a job area with a traineeship or completing a PLC course that will equip you with great transferable skills for the workplace or college. For too long our system wrongly has suggested that immediate entry into 3rd level was the only option. The costs were often prohibitive and put unnecessary pressure on families. With the many dynamic options available to our unique students, there are so many excellent options and pathways to choose from. We as a school are extremely proud that 23% of our student graduates chose the apprentice pathway in 2018.

John Gorman, Principal, Rosses Community College When considering pathways after a Leaving Certificate, young people should give serious consideration to all opportunities available to them including those opportunities in Further Education. As well as developing education and working from a knowledge based programme, students in Further Education develop transferable skills particularly through work experience and placements. They learn on the job, put theory into practice and as a result are very aware and very capable for positions as they arise. In my experience those who go through the Further Education system gain great experience and are directly employable as result.

Graduates from apprenticeships, courses and Post-Leaving Cert (PLC) courses are rated highly by employers in areas such as team-working, commercial awareness and entrepreneurial skills. Feedback from employers is that they are most satisfied with graduates' computer skills, verbal communication, numeracy, and written skills.

In terms of personal attributes, employers rate highly **331** students' work ethic, reliability, positive attitudes and ethical and social awareness.

Many of the **TT** courses on offer now have increased participation in work placements and engaged learning opportunities. The modes of assessment used often have increased focus on student project work and problem solving which is so relevant in the employment context.

As Principal of a large school, I am delighted to see an increasing interest in Further Education and Training [13] as an option after Leaving Certificate. For too long a small but significant group of students have limited success in our academic, exam-led school system simply because their practical skills and abilities were undervalued with no viable educational pathway to harness their capabilities. The expansion of apprenticeships and traineeships into newer occupations such as ICT is to be welcomed and should go in some way towards paving the way for these skilled based opportunities to sit comfortably as an option alongside a direct progression to higher education. Gaps in our workforce, the forgotten middle skills jobs, the high drop-out rate at third level and associated costs offer a niche that **11** can comfortably fill.
